This lodge was built in 1924 and became a hideaway for well known people such as Walt Disney, Zane Grey, Herbert Hoover, Bing Crosby, Clark Gable and Carole Lombard. Clark and Carole use to hole up there for weeks at a time while fishing for salmon and steelhead. When Carole died in the plane crash in 1942 at age 33, after just 3 years of marriage, Clark stayed in his upstairs room in the lodge for 3 weeks while dealing with the tragic loss of the woman to whom he had given his life.

The place we stayed was a rustic looking but modernized cabin with a refreshing view, large Jacuzzi tub and large, stone, wood burning fireplace. I used a black and yellow Panther Martin to catch 4 trout and one steelhead with an intact dorsal fin. They are all back in the swift moving rapids awaiting your arrival with a number of larger steelhead and salmon.
